- From March 2021 - 31st July 2022 schools have had further disruptions this year with high levels of staff absence due to COVID19.
- Restrictions have limited contact and sporting activities have had to take place outside and adhere to social distancing. Swimming was concealed.
- PE leader left the school in December 2021
- PE coach - long term absence
- Due to high levels of COVID swimming has not taken place in the school until the summer term 2021 where the school prioritised Y6.
