Invading Britannia

Saturn's day, 20 Maius

We're finally ready to go. I've been waiting for this since we first heard of the invasion plans two months ago, but it's taken every week of Aprilis and most of Maius to get things ready. The Second Legion arrived first (of course we did), but now the rest have caught up. We've got three other legions, which makes 20,000 of us real Romans, and just as many auxiliary troops pulled from conquered parts of the empire. It won't be long until we're adding Britons to their numbers!

We spent most of the day loading equipment onto ships and checking our weapons. We've got some nasty ballista catapults to fire giant iron arrows into any forts we come across. Someone told me the Britons have great walls of earth piled up to protect them on the tops of mountains. Nothing a few ballista bolts and a tortoise shield formation can't crack! I've got my shield, javelins, sword, armour and the wooden stakes we all carry to make a wall around our camps. I'm all set! Tomorrow, we head out to victory!




